MESSAGE FROM THE CEO



FORWARD

This year, Dr. Sarah Roos, Psy.D. joined the Clinical Services team to perform court-ordered parenting strengths and needs assessments for parents involved with Jefferson County Family Court. She evaluates mental health functioning as well as individual and systemic factors that may impact an individual's ability to parent their child effectively and safely, such as housing, employment,

food security, social supports, and access to services. The assessment not only recognizes and addresses barriers but capitalizes on strengths. Families can be connected to other JFCS services for additional support overcoming barriers.

ONE CONNECTION AT A TIME CAREER & ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

Allison came to Career Services through JFCS Clinical Services after sharing that she was underemployed and didn't feel valued at her job. Her career counselor worked alongside her therapist to help Allison identify and set short-term goals, provide career counseling, job search preparation and mental health counseling. With a boost to her confidence, Allison re-entered the job market and eventually chose a position that aligned most with her goals. Allison earned a 38.7% salary increase and is now thriving in her new position.

JFCS NAVIGATE

JFCS Navigate connected with local organizations like: Somali Community of Louisville, Catholic Charities, Goodwill Industries of Kentucky, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Louisville Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, AI Diá en Américá, Office of Globalization, Louisville Forward, and Bates Memorial Baptist Church, to expand possibilities for small business owners in Greater Louisville. JFCS Navigate's strengthened community connection will support entrepreneurs while also providing individualized assistance and guidance.



Thanks to funding from the Legacy Foundation of Kentuckiana, JFCS will introduce **LAUNCH**, a workshop-based program for young adults aged 16-24 that will help define career paths, build confidence and promote self-discovery.

KLEIN OLDER Adult Services

William was experiencing cognitive changes that gradually began to impact daily living and safety in his home. JFCS completed a thorough assessment to define his care needs and understand William's goals. Initially, this included counseling and nonmedical homecare to support his desire to remain independent. Over time, JFCS helped William realistically look at his situation and plan for likely changes. As his condition declined, he agreed to engage family and friends in a compassionate planning process. Family Caregiver Support provided guidance and facilitated his transition into alternate living. As a result, William made a supported move to the nursing home of his choice and is receiving the care needed to manage cognitive and physical aging. Now he feels safe and enjoys opportunities for social connection while his family has relief from constant worry.

HOLISTICALLY SERVING CLIENTS

When life's challenges become overwhelming, JFCS Family Stability Services connects you to resources and services that promote long-term success and financial independence. Our case managers use an individualized, holistic approach that recognizes the strengths of our clients as the starting point for achieving goals. With compassion and support, we identify and set objectives, define barriers and discover solutions and most importantly, build resilience. Our clients do the work— our case managers simply guide them through a process to prioritize their goals, improve their well-being and fulfill their potential. Family Stability services include case management to facilitate the coordination of agency and external resources and services, crisis intervention, emergency financial assistance, food pantry and financial coaching.

THIS PAST YEAR CASE MANAGERS HELPED 67% OF FAMILY STABILITY CLIENTS INCREASE THEIR SELF-SUFFICIENCY SCORES MEASURING STABILITY IN AREAS LIKE HOUSING, EDUCATION, FINANCE AND MENTAL HEALTH.

WHAT WE DOBEST

Rachel and Ben first came to JFCS for weekend Chabad services that were held in the JFCS board room. The couple was struggling to make ends meet after losing their jobs during the pandemic. Through accessing multiple JFCS services they were able to expand their possibilities in a variety of ways. JFCS helped them gain assistance through SNAP, access our food pantry, and create a budget to ensure they remain stably housed. They were also connected to JFCS Navigate to explore their small business ideas and JFCS Clinical Services to manage their stress. As they continued meeting their goals, they also prioritized giving back, inquiring about volunteering in the same food pantry they utilized. By connecting Rachel and Ben to JFCS services and local resources, the compassion they received now ripples out into our community. Holistically serving clients and meeting them where they are is what JFCS does best.



JEWISH LIFE AT JFCS

In February, JFCS announced a partnership with Project Friendship, a social service arm of Chabad of Kentucky, who works with major retailers to donate excess product. In a short time, Project Friendship has amassed pallets and truckloads of clothes, shoes and home goods that they distribute to various nonprofits throughout Louisville, including JFCS. We opened our own Friendship Corner in March, providing clothes and goods to JFCS clients in need.

In April, a devastating fire destroyed the Chabad building. While no one was physically harmed, JFCS therapists supported and provided comfort to children who witnessed the fire. We also served as compassionate neighbors and offered our Board Room for Chabad's weekend services as they rebuilt.


